**MEETING CALL TO ORDER**

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

**April 18, 2018**

**Motion to approve and accept: Robin, 2<sup>nd</sup> Bill, approved.**

**OPEN FORUM**

- Sue Hughes-Smith joined us from Rochester People's Climate Coalition to clear up some common misconceptions about Community Choice Aggregation, since it is a complicated issue that bears some explanation
- She shared materials with us to better explain how a CCA works within NY's energy marketplace
- In particular, she explained how renewable energy generation is tracked by NYS through a system of credits, in order to ensure that it is legitimately sourced from renewable power generation and that those credits are correctly accounted for. This allows the consumer to have confidence that the energy that they are paying for is sourced from where the distributors claim it is generated.
- We discussed the NYS classification mechanism administered by New York Generation Attribute Tracking System (NYGATS) through NYSERDA (The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority)
- Since they are so quickly proliferating, of particular note, are solar energy sources and how they are being incorporated into the system, as it relates to CCA Administration
- Comparison of 3 available CCA Plans was discussed and shared (handout)
- Discussion of costs and benefits for the various plans
- Invited to attend Small Government Workshop at Burgundy Basin from 1:00 – 2:00 pm on 5/16 to discuss

**CONTINUING BUSINESS**

**Park Issues: Matt Beeman**

- **The Brighton Town Park** - Windows and roof replacement project is completed
- **Community Development Block Grant** - Final approval from the county was received with sign off of proposed vendors for that project
- Will move forward with automatic door openers, step 1
- Removal and replacement of pavement and sidewalks, step 2
- Working on scheduling time to complete these projects and coordinating staff work forces with contracted work
- Anticipated completion by the end of August

- **Smoking and Vaping Law** discussed and suggestions regarding language to make sure it is all inclusive of current available technologies/mechanisms. Enforcement was also discussed.
- **A public hearing will be set at the next Town Board Meeting in order to consider the Smoking and Vaping Law** potentially for the second Town Board meeting of June
- **Dredging of Buckland Park wet areas was discussed.** This portion of the park is designated as a Federal Wetlands. Mike Guyon is working to see if the Town can clear the blocked areas

### **Recreation Programs: Becky Cotter**

- Non Resident Registration began for all programs on May 15
- Outdoor Pool Discussion regarding maintenance of the building in the short term versus long term...and the Staff's ability to manage and repair pool and grounds with existing resources, annually, without capital improvement
- Pricing estimate for repairs at the Outdoor Pool will be obtained and added to the CIP if it rises to that level. We hope to gather information regarding immediate costs of interim repair on an annual basis vs. costs of a CIP
- Future planning for Community Center/Outdoor Pool/Splash Park was discussed
- Community Center will be included in CIP request

### **Winter Farm Market Update**

- We obtained our architectural drawings, but due to lackluster response, the bid schedule has been extended by 2 weeks to allow for more bid responses
- The Scope of the project was discussed as well as the phases of construction
- Phase one funding deadline is late Spring 2019

### **Corbett's Glen Advisory Council Recommendations: Matt Beeman**

- Proposed wording for signage was distributed and discussed
- 4 signs were reviewed
- Locations of signs was discussed
- Size would be the same as 'no parking' signs
- Sign 1 - Welcoming, background, rules
- Sign 2 - Focuses on 20 yard area of CG South. By the trailhead sign and down to Postcard Falls area
- Sign 3 & 4 - Outlines Park Codes
- Sign 3 & 4 - Placed near trail heads and scattered throughout the trails spaced out
- New Law discussed regarding giving Park's Superintendent authority to designate spaces off limits; language of that law was brought up regarding enforcement of prohibited activity on signs and placement and distribution of signs across park.
- Discussion of number of signs, could sign proposal 3 and 4 be combined into 1 sign?
- Included at trailhead kiosks will be a notice of authority of Park Superintendent to designate areas as off-limits and notice should include a map of the off limits areas
- The old dump site was discussed and should be included in the "Off Limits" area, including signage there as well
- Final signs and plans for sign placement will be reviewed and finalized with Matt, Bill, Dennis and anyone else who would like to contribute

### **2018 Annual Clean Sweep Debrief**

- Very successful event
- Increased participation from high School
- Over 300 participants this year

- Event functioned smoothly despite the weather
- Student volunteers didn't show up to serve food at FRES Lunch
- \$2250 in donations for 2018 - overall costs were low, but a lot of current inventory was used

**Challenges:**

- Chris Werner, Katie Tytler, and Sarah Silva jumped in to serve food
- Clean up at FRES after lunch was sparsely attended, so burden fell upon too few
- Trash pick-up locations were not always communicated, so collection of bagged garbage was delayed after the event was over, in one instance.

**Semi-Annual Document Shredding and Electronics Recycling Event Planning Update – May 19, 2018**

- Concerns over people present to handle the volume of materials discussed
- Volunteers need to be solidly in place to handle the day
- Vendors confirmed to be arriving before the scheduled start time for the event

**Inclusion, Diversity and Equity Advisory Committee Update**

- First 16 applicants have been interviewed
- Another call for applicants was put out to ensure that diverse populations were represented in the group
- That call out resulted in additional applicants to come in, including some high school students
- No age limitation was included on the call for applications

**Community Choice Aggregation Law Update**

**Schedule Community Forum for potential CCA Administrators**

- Now that we have passed the enabling local law, the next step in the process is to begin the selection process for a CCA Administrator
- We discussed that there is interest in scheduling a presentation to the Town Board to learn more about what the different administrators offer
- In the interest of receiving an objective presentation, those present suggested Matt Halladay (who is in charge of the Clean Energy Communities Program) out of David Zorn's Office at the Genesee/Finger Lakes Regional Planning Council as a possible presenter.

**Beautification Committee Update**

- Matt met with Mike Guyon and Tim Anderson regarding the Parks Department helping direct/coordinate with volunteers for Clean Sweep type of projects/and other ongoing work
- Matt and Park staff also met regarding needed work at the Twelve Corners Park Pergola, pricing will be sought, and work can be done by park staff in the fall. Matt will also get pricing for the needed repairs
- Rose Garden was weeded and mulched during Clean Sweep, and Gary Donafrio finished up mulching that wasn't completed this week
- Long term decisions regarding the future of the Rose Garden needs to be determined
- Call for applicants has gone out for the Beautification Committee, a small pool of responses has been received so far

**New Neighbor Welcome Update**

Tabled until we have a chance to discuss cooperation with BCSD, possibly through Brighton Believes.

### **Color Brighton Green T-Shirt Sale: Mitch Nellis**

- Part of Clean Sweep work was the installation of 12 new trees planted at French Road Elementary School provided by Color Brighton Green
- Ongoing T-Shirt Sale fundraiser to purchase future trees for planting. Fliers are available at Town Hall
- Color Brighton Green will reach out to other local groups via social media to help promote their fundraiser and have fliers available at the Farmer's Market

### **Veterans Memorial Sign Update: Jim Vogel**

- Matt was able to get pricing for a sign to be added to the existing Buckland House sign, new sign cost was \$999
- Installation scheduled before Memorial Day as long as the sign comes in


