# Supervisor's Message

many of my Town Hall colleagues working in our temporary home at SUNY Empire State University. For the next 18-24 months, many of our Town offices will be located here at 680 Westfall Rd. while the 71-year-old Town Hall is renovated.

The main reason for the renovation is the obsolete and poorly functioning HVAC system that left some rooms, including the main auditorium, unbearably hot, while other areas remained persistently cold. Town Hall was built in the 1950s, when asbestos was used in construction for many reasons, so asbestos abatement will be an important part of the project. We will build a small addition on the rear of the building for our facilities and maintenance department, and we will add solar panels to the Town Hall roof. This project will give us the opportunity to enhance technology and security in Town Hall, while maintaining and restoring design features that make Town Hall so striking. In addition to the interior work, we will also improve drainage and repave and reconfigure parking and traffic flow around the building, to calm traffic and improve safety for all users.

During the construction project, the Town Clerk, Town Supervisor, Town Assessor, Department of Public Works and Planning will be at Empire, along with our internal administrative offices, including Finance, Personnel, Information Technology, and Chief Diversity Officer. If you need to interact with any of these offices, for example, to get licenses or pay taxes at

the Town Clerk's office or speak with the Town Assessor about any property tax exemptions to which you may be entitled, you will do so at our new Empire State University offices. When you enter the building, our information desk can help you decide where you are going. Our offices are on the second floor of the Empire State University building and are accessible by elevator or by stairs. All telephone numbers remain the same and all meetings, including Town Board meetings, will be held at Empire. The Brighton Memorial Library, Brighton Police Department and Brighton Town Court will remain at Town Hall, 2300 Elmwood Avenue.

The Town Hall project is just one of many recent Town projects supported in whole or in part by grants or similar third-party funding. Although the Town will issue bonds to support a significant part of the cost of the Town Hall project, we also received \$500,000 in state grant funding, thanks to Senator Jeremy Cooney, and expect as much as \$900,000 in federal Inflation Reduction Act credits. We also received grants from Senator Cooney and Assembly Member Sarah Clark for our planned recreational facilities at Town Hall. Those grants, totaling \$1.2 million, will allow the Town to rehabilitate the Town Hall swimming pool, build a new splash pad and replace the existing playground with a new and accessible playground. We received a \$750,000 grant from Senator Cooney for a new sidewalk on a difficult segment of East Avenue near Allens Creek School and nearly \$900,000 in grants from Monroe County under a new grant program for the construction of sidewalks along County roads. We also received nearly \$900,000 in state law enforcement grants. All these grants help make it possible to continue to improve the quality of life in Brighton, while still maintaining our financial strength. The Town received a perfect score for fiscal strength in 2024 for the third straight year from NYS Comptroller DiNapoli. We will continue to make successful grant funding an important part of our capital

improvements budget in the coming year.

As everyone knows, real estate prices have risen dramatically in Brighton and throughout the Rochester area during the past several years. 14618 was even named the "Hottest Zip Code in America" in 2022 by Realtor.com. As a result of these increasing values, the Town of Brighton will conduct a town-wide property reassessment in 2025, to ensure that all real estate is valued at fair market value for purposes of assessing property taxes. It is important to remember that an increase in your assessed valuation does **not** mean that your taxes will necessarily go up; instead, it simply reflects that your home's fair market value has risen. Early next year, you will receive an initial valuation, which should reflect 100% of the fair market value of your home. The goal is to ensure that all properties, residential and commercial, are valued at their fair market value. You will have three opportunities to appeal that valuation, and the new assessment will become effective for your 2025 school tax bill in September. If you have questions about your assessment, either now or during the revaluation process, call the Town Assessor's office at 784-5215.

## Brighton Farmers Market

The 2024 summer season of Sundays at the Brighton Farmers Market was the best one yet. We're grateful to the entire community, our vendors, customers, and supporters for their commitment to the success of the Market. The winter season is now open, with the Market's return to the beautiful new Market barn at 1435 Westfall Road. Several additional vendors from the summer season are participating this winter, with a wide variety of offerings, including storage crops, fresh greens and other vegetables, apples, meats, eggs, baked goods, and much more.

# Assessor's News

We have been busy in recent weeks processing the many renewal exemption applications we have received. If you have not done so already, please take note that **March 1, 2025 is the filing deadline** for all Real Property Tax Exemptions.

If you are turning 65 in 2025 and your 2023 gross income is less than \$107,300 you may be eligible for the Enhanced Star exemption. Call our office at (585) 784-5215 or stop by for the application. If you qualify, you will receive these additional savings off your 2024 school tax bill.

New home owners may apply for their STAR credit check through NYS Department of Taxation and Finance at (518) 457-2036 or at [www.tax.ny.gov](http://www.tax.ny.gov).

The Limited Income Senior Citizen exemption is available if you are 65 or older and your **total** income based upon the 2023 Federal tax returns is below \$58,400. If you believe you are entitled to this exemption, stop by the Assessor's Office, or visit the Assessor's page on our website at [www.townofbrighton.org](http://www.townofbrighton.org) for the application and instructions on how to apply.

## Message from the Chief

Winter driving can bring special hazards, so even driving at the speed limit may be too fast for inclement winter conditions. Remember that pedestrians are still out during the winter, and kids may be challenging to see, particularly when snow piles line our streets. Also, "Don't crowd the plow!" Snowplows need extra room to operate. Please give them that room,

and don't try to pass snowplows or pass them in close quarters.

Winter Parking is now in effect, so parking vehicles on highways, shoulders, or within three feet of the pavement within the Town is prohibited between the hours of 2:00 am and 7:00 am through April 15th. **The 2025 Town and County Tax bills will be mailed at the end of December.** If you have not received your bill by January 15, please call my office at (585) 784-5240 right away so we can investigate.

As you probably know by now, OUR OFFICES HAVE MOVED! However, if you plan on mailing your payments to us, nothing changes. Installments or full payments are still mailed to Daniel Aman, Receiver of Taxes, 2300 Elmwood Ave., Rochester, NY 14618. Our drop boxes are still located at 2300 Elmwood as well. Due to the upcoming construction, we had to relocate the outdoor box from the back of the building to the front. It is now at the main entrance of the Police Department (facing Elmwood) at door #2. This drop box is available 24/7 for your convenience. There is also a payment drop box inside the Brighton Police lobby, available weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Please make sure to write your name and property address on the outside of the envelope before you drop it in the slot.

If you prefer to pay your bill in person, remember that we are now located at 680 Westfall Road, on the 2nd floor of the Empire State University building.

Everyone whose taxes are paid via escrow is automatically sent a receipt for their taxes. If you pay your taxes directly, please check the box if you would like a receipt. We do not send receipts for each installment, only when you finish paying off the bill. Sending out the receipts is a manual process, so it takes some time to get done, but don't worry, we will get it mailed out to you. If the need arises for a receipt for a specific installment, just give us a call and we will be happy to mail it to you. You can also request a receipt at any time from our website at [townofbrighton.org/taxinfo](http://townofbrighton.org/taxinfo). The website has all kinds of other useful information about your taxes as well. In addition to requesting copies of

Instead, think of that first installment as being due on January 31. There is no reason to strain your household budget to try and squeeze two payments into the shortest month of the year!

# WINTER POLICIES

The Town of Brighton is responsible for snow and ice control on town, county, and state roads within the Town of Brighton except for state expressways. As winter approaches, we want to remind everyone of the regulations that provide for the safety of the traveling public on main roads and neighborhood streets during the snow and ice season. Our Highway Department dispatchers are on duty 24 hours a day during the winter season and may be reached at (585) 784-5280.

## Important Winter Policies to Know

- Highway and Road Salting - Our Highway Department follows the "Sensible Salting Guidelines" established by Monroe County, in conjunction with the Environmental Management Council. A study conducted in 1970 concluded that extensive use of road-deicing salts in the drainage basin of Irondequoit Bay changed the bay's chemical and thermal characteristics. The bay's drainage basin contains urban, suburban, and rural land and is intersected by highways and roads that were heavily treated with deicing salts in the late 1960s and early 1970s. In the mid-1970s, Monroe County began a cooperative effort with towns in the county to decrease the amount of salt being used for deicing. This effort is commonly referred to as "Sensible Salting."

Sensible Salting is defined by the Salt Institute as applying the right amount in the right place at the right time. Sensible salting requires, among other things, careful application of salt, good spreading equipment, calibration of spreaders, automatic controls, adequate covered storage, proper maintenance around storage areas, and an awareness

by all who use salt of the need to protect the environment. Sensible salting also requires sensible driving. The Town of Brighton's Sensible Salting program requires that the use of salt on local roads (Town of Brighton roads) be limited to hills, sharp turns, traffic signals and stop signs. State, county and local arterial roads are fully treated and receive salt in accordance with the "Recommended Snow and Ice Treatment for Monroe County Highways and Streets."

- Mailboxes - It is the Town's policy to repair mailboxes that are damaged by Town plows during snow plowing operations or to replace them with a standard rural mailbox and post. Since there is no legal authority which grants an owner the right to place a mailbox along a public road in the right-of-way, our repairs and replacements are done as a courtesy. The one-piece plastic post/box combinations or any type of custom mailboxes will be replaced with our standard post and box. If you have an expensive and/or decorative mailbox and/or post, it may be worth considering the option of storing it for the winter and replacing it with an inexpensive assembly.
- Winter Parking - In order to facilitate snow removal and to eliminate potential hazards, the parking of vehicles on all highways, shoulders, or within three feet of the pavement within the Town is prohibited between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. from November 1 to April 15. Vehicles in violation of this ordinance are subject to a parking ticket. Repeat violators or vehicles that prevent plowing of a street will be towed and the vehicles' owner will be responsible for all towing and storage charges.
- Driveway Clearing - When clearing your driveway of snow, the snow shall be kept on your own property. Pushing, blowing or plowing snow onto any street is a ticket-able offense under both

New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law and the New York State Penal Law. If your driveway is plowed by a private contractor, both you (as the property owner) and the plow operator may be ticketed. Snow should be pushed to the left side of your driveway (if you are facing your house) so that when Town snowplows go past your house, it will minimize the amount of snow going back into your driveway.

- Lawn Damage - The Town will repair lawn damage resulting from our snow removal process. The Town generally begins lawn damage restoration in May and continues through the summer months. In most cases, the Town relies on resident reports to identify lawn damage. Once the Town receives a report of lawn damage, a service request is created. Lawn damage restoration consists of placing topsoil and grass seed. It is the owner's responsibility to water and maintain the restored areas.

## Important Winter Policies to Know

Winter driving can be very dangerous and requires motorists to be fully alert and aware of their surrounding conditions. Below are some things that can be done by motorists to improve their chances of having a safe driving experience.

- Don't drive unless you must.
- If you must drive, drive defensively, wear your seatbelt, turn your headlights on if conditions warrant their use, be alert and exercise extreme caution. Driving on snow and ice packed roads requires your full attention.
- Be informed of the current and predicted weather conditions for your area.
- Prepare your vehicle in advance of inclement weather. Regularly check the battery, antifreeze, windshield wipers, heater and defroster. Have at least a half a tank of fuel and have adequate snow tires or chains on your vehicle.

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- Clean all snow and ice from your vehicle, including all glass areas, headlights and taillights before driving.
- Have some basic equipment and extra clothing in your vehicle in case of an accident, long delay or mechanical problems. Some useful items to have are a flashlight, jumper cables, first aid kit, a hat, gloves, boots, blanket, ice scraper and possibly a small shovel.
- Allow yourself extra distance between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you. This is especially true at intersections where other motorists may be skidding and having difficulty stopping their vehicle.

- Remember to brake slowly to avoid skidding.
- Allow yourself extra time to get to your destination, as you will likely be travelling at a slower speed than normal. This is especially true of vehicles that get caught behind a snowplow.

### How You Can Help

There are several things that motorists can do to help the Highway Department best perform their snow and ice control duties:

- Be patient with everyone else on the highways, including snowplows.
- Be assured that during a snow or ice event every reasonable effort will be made to keep the roads open.

- Be considerate of the snowplow operators.
- Do not attempt to stop a snowplow or obstruct its path. Plow trucks, when loaded with sand and salt, weigh approximately 31 tons. These trucks are not as maneuverable as a passenger vehicle. They require extra time and distance to stop or avoid trouble.
- When approaching snow removal equipment from the rear, travel a minimum of 200 feet behind the equipment allowing for salting and abrupt movements.
- Use extreme caution when passing snow removal equipment. Before you pass, please flash your headlights and/or honk your horn to alert the operator of your intentions.

# Thanks to Talking is Teaching Bundles

Four years ago, when the world was just starting to reopen from the COVID-19 shutdown, Brighton Memorial Library (BML) Children's Services Manager Elissa Schaeffer and her team were noticing moms and caretakers of babies born during the shutdown were struggling to find ways to connect. Story times, programs, and activities were still on hold at the library for fear of spreading the virus.

The BML team thought sending a monthly packet home for new parents would help. They adopted the national Talking is Teaching program, which highlights the importance of talking, reading, singing, and playing with your child from birth.

Nancy Fella was the second person to sign up for BML's Talking is Teaching program. A retired pediatric nurse, she saw a need for her granddaughter, Olive,

who was two at the time, to participate in a fun reading program while being stuck at home.

Nancy learned about the program through BML's online story time and e-newsletter. She signed them up and has watched her granddaughter's reading skills soar. "She's always loved books," Nancy said of Olive. "The first books [in the bundles] were a bit advanced, but now she sounds out the letters and reads words like lukewarm and sophisticated."

The duo also completes the bundle activities together, initially with Nancy cutting out the shapes and now Olive mastering the task. "I've saved all of the activities and add to them as Olive advances," said the proud grandparent. "I've added different colors to the fish unit and washers for eyes and a magnetic fishing pole. This is her favorite activity."

Olive added that she also loves the delivery driver game unit, which lets her take things to the mailbox. The monthly coloring pages are another favorite.

"Any learning deficiencies have dissolved," Nancy said. "She loves to read on her own now."

BML's program is designed for parents and caregivers with children ages birth-

to-4-years-old. Each bundle includes books based on a monthly theme, a calendar of activity ideas and learning tips, a song sheet and rhymes, extension activities, an optional music CD, and more.

## Upcoming Reassessment

A townwide reassessment will be conducted for the 2025 Assessment Roll. As determined by the Assessor's Office and the New York State Office of Real Property, the town is currently assessed at 65% of market value. A reassessment is needed to ensure all properties are assessed at a fair and equitable market value. Since the last reassessment in 2018, the real estate

market has seen some dramatic changes in the price of real estate, therefore, a reassessment is needed to ensure equity. Property owners are welcome and encouraged to research the market value of their property.
