FORWARD

The year 2010 was a time of change for the Brighton Police Department. Chief Thomas M. Voelkl retired after a 38-year law enforcement career. Chief Voelkl served the Town of Brighton as Chief of Police for over 19 years. Chief Voelkl strongly believed in community policing and as such instilled this as the philosophy of the Brighton Police Department.

Professionalism, quality of service and training ranked at the top of the list of priorities for Chief Voelkl. Under the leadership and guidance of Chief Voelkl the Brighton Police Department became a New York State Accredited Law Enforcement Agency. The members of the department, and specifically this writer, acknowledge the considerable contributions of Chief Thomas M. Voelkl.

In 2010 the Brighton Police Department responded to **34,810 calls for service, a 2% increase** from 2009. Crime Statistics for 2010 show that combined Part I and Part II OFFENSES **decreased by 4%** and total INCIDENTS **decreased by 9%.** **Burglaries decreased by 13%, larcenies decreased by 11% and overall arrests increased by 8%** from 2009.

The residents of the Town of Brighton have indicated that traffic issues are among the highest concerns that they have. As such, traffic education and traffic enforcement are a priority for the Brighton Police Department. The Department deploys "Officer Smart," a traffic survey device that captures the speed of vehicles while displaying the speed to drivers. This device allows the department to collect quantitative data while letting drivers know their speed in relation to the posted speed limit. The Brighton Police Department issued a total of **5,205 traffic ticket citations, a 14% increase from 2009.**

The Brighton Police Department is committed to public safety for the residents and visitors of the Town of Brighton. The police cannot prevent crime alone. We need the assistance of residents to help prevent crime in our community. The department works with neighborhood associations on areas of concern relating to public safety. We provide information on crime trends and patterns via the "Police Blotter." The Police Blotter can be found on the Town website www.townofbrighton.org.

I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude and appreciation to Supervisor Sandra Frankel and the members of the Brighton Town Board for their continued support of the Brighton Police Department. On a personal note, I would like to thank Supervisor Frankel and Board members for giving me an opportunity to lead the finest law enforcement organization in New York State.

The men and women of the Brighton Police Department, *at all levels of the organization*, are dedicated to providing quality policing services to the Brighton community. I am truly amazed at the level of talent and commitment of the members of the Brighton Police Department. I am honored to serve with them.







2010 COMMENDATIONS

Each year, the Brighton Police Department recognizes exceptional contributions to the field of public safety by individuals both within the Department and in the community. The following awards were presented at the 18th annual awards ceremony held on May 3, 2010. Following are excerpts from the awards ceremony.

Officer David Swancott and Investigator Thomas Schirmer Excellent Police Service Award

On July 22, 2009, patrols were responding to a larceny in progress at Tops Market located at 1900 South Clinton Avenue. A male was reported to have stolen property and to be in possession of a knife. The suspect, Ronnie Prince, was reported leaving the scene in a taxi. Officer Dave Swancott responded and observed a taxi with a lone occupant/driver northbound on South Clinton Avenue. Officer Swancott stopped the taxi near the 7 Eleven Store and approached the driver's side of the taxi and observed a male matching the suspect description lying on the floor of the taxi.

Officer Swancott and Inv. Schirmer approached the taxi from opposite sides and confronted the suspect. Officer Swancott observed a knife on the floor of the taxi. After a brief struggle, the suspect was handcuffed and removed from the taxi with beef, pork and shrimp concealed in the legs of his pants. The suspect was arraigned before Judge Falk on a Robbery 1st charge and remanded to Monroe County Jail on \$15,000 cash/\$30,000 bond. Both Officers are commended for taking an armed suspect into custody without incident or injury. In recognition of their quick and decisive actions, Officer Swancott and Investigator Schirmer were presented with the Excellent Police Service Award.

Officer Brian Cecere Excellent Police Service Award

On November 22, 2009 at approximately 2100 hours, while on routine patrol, Officer Brian Cecere observed two suspicious white males attempting to push a shopping cart filled with black insulated copper wire northbound on East Henrietta Road in the Town of Brighton. Having knowledge of previous larcenies involving this type of material and the value of said material, Officer Cecere stopped and detained the individuals and investigated the suspicious activity further. A lengthy and thorough investigation completed by Officer Cecere and Monroe County Sheriff's Deputy Wildman revealed the copper wire was just stolen from O'Connel Electric located in the Town of Henrietta. The stop and detainment by Officer Cecere, along with the thorough criminal investigation, resulted in the Felony arrests of Michael and Thomas Valenta for Criminal Possession of Stolen Property in the 4th Degree and the recovery of over 200 feet of insulated copper wire valued at \$2400. The arrest may have also put an end to previously reported larcenies from O'Connel Electric involving the same type of material. For his self-initiated activity, Police intuition and keen observation skills, Officer Cecere was presented with the Excellent Police Service Award.

2010 COMMENDATIONS

Officer Allison Gromek and Officer Michael Romach Excellent Police Service Award

Over a several month period in 2009, there were numerous incidents of graffiti throughout the Twelve Corners area. These incidents were a nuisance to many business owners and were an eyesore to the entire community. There was little or no information to initiate a targeted investigation.

On August 8, 2009 at 0118 hours, while Officer Romach was acting as a Field Training Officer, he directed his trainee, Officer Allison Gromek, to stop two suspicious males walking from the area of Elmer's Garage on Monroe Avenue. After making contact with the two males, the encounter led to their vehicle parked across the street. Officer Romach was well aware of the graffiti problem in the immediate area and initiated a proactive field investigation. He was able to gain a consent to search of the suspects' vehicle, which led to the discovery of paint cans, paint markers and other graffiti-making instruments. This pedestrian stop ultimately led to the clearance of at least 10 incidents of making graffiti in Brighton, one burglary arrest in Brighton and at least 15 other incidents outside of Brighton. The dollar amount for the damage caused for all the incidents is between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

The burglary was solved after one of the graffiti suspects was fingerprinted as part of the booking process. A Statewide Automated Fingerprint Identification System (SAFIS) match identified this suspect, and a burglary at the Brighton Central School District Office that occurred in 2007 was also solved.

In recognition of their proactive field investigation and decisive action, Officer Allison Gromek and Officer Romach were presented with the Excellent Police Service Award.

Officer James Shafer, Officer Scott Corey, Investigator Gary Ciulla Excellent Police Service Award

On February 16, 2009 at 1111 hours, Officers Shafer and Corey responded to a burglary call at 555 Penfield Road. The suspect was last seen walking away from the area of Penfield Road/North Landing Road. Officer Jim Shafer gave out a suspect description immediately. Officer Corey checked the railroad tracks near Penhurst Road and observed a male matching the description. Officer Corey broadcast a detailed description of the suspect and began a foot pursuit of the suspect, but lost sight of him in the City of Rochester. Officers from the Rochester Police Department responded to the area and with the assistance of a citizen, were able to locate the suspect.

2010 COMMENDATIONS

The suspect was transported to the Brighton Police Department. While at BPD, Investigator Ciulla was able to get a verbal confession from the suspect. The suspect, a career felon who was on Parole at the time, was arrested for the residential Burglary on Penfield Road.

In recognition of their outstanding collective and individual efforts, Officer James Shafer, Officer Scott Corey and Investigator Gary Ciulla were awarded the Excellent Police Service Award.

Officer Timothy Karch Excellent Police Service Award

Officer Karch has been a member of the Brighton Police Department since 2003. Each year since joining the Department, Officer Karch has led the Patrol Division in the area of overall traffic enforcement, specifically in the areas of DWI, seat belt usage, and aggressive driving violations. In addition, his passion for traffic safety goes beyond just his enforcement efforts. In the areas of traffic safety prevention, Tim has been instrumental in anti-DWI presentations, numerous Drivers' Education Programs at Brighton Schools and Monroe Community College. Tim also compiles and monitors monthly statistics involving Motor Vehicle Accidents within the Town of Brighton. Tim utilizes this statistical data to assist with traffic enforcement in targeted areas in hopes of reducing motor vehicle accidents on specific roadways within the Town of Brighton. Tim's efforts, along with other Officers, have significantly reduced motor vehicle accidents within the Town of Brighton. Officer Karch has been awarded multiple certificates of appreciation from Mothers Against Drunk Driving and Monroe County Executive Maggie Brooks for his commitment to STOP-DWI.

In recognition of Officer Karch's dedication and outstanding service in confronting and combating the problem of DWI and aggressive driving within our community, he was presented with the Excellent Police Service Award.

Officer Lisa Hillier Excellent Police Service Award

On May 26, 2009 at 2251 hours, Officer Hillier responded to an attempted robbery that just occurred at the Twelve Corners Mobil Service Station on Monroe Avenue. Officer Hillier heard additional information giving a direction of travel and a vague description of the suspect who fled on foot. She located John Burgio walking on Elmwood Avenue, carrying a camouflage jacket, a short distance from the scene. After a brief field interview, he was taken for a "show-up", which was inconclusive. However, reasonable suspicion was developed for detaining him further. Officer Hillier was able to gain rapport with the suspect and eventually obtain a full signed confession. As a result of her investigative effort, the suspected was arrested for the felony of Attempted Robbery 3rd Degree.

In recognition of her action and investigative effort, Officer Hillier was presented with the Excellent Police Service Award.

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2010 COMMENDATIONS

Officer Mark Liberatore and Officer Jeffrey Ruffalo Excellent Police Service Award

On May 23, 2009 at 2239 hours, Officers Liberatore and Ruffalo responded to the Rochester Automobile Dealers Association for an alarm. Upon arrival, Officer Liberatore observed a window screen in the bushes and a damaged window. Officer Liberatore could see two suspects inside the building. Officers Liberatore and Ruffalo established an exterior perimeter that prevented the suspects from escaping. With the assistance of MCSO's K-9 Unit, entry was made. At that time, two juveniles surrendered without incident and were charged with Burglary.

In recognition of their quick and decisive actions, Officer Mark Liberatore and Officer Jeffrey Ruffalo were presented with the Excellent Police Service Award.

Mr. Peter Cup Citizen Award

On June 20, 2009 at 9:50 am, Peter Cup was walking out of the Summit Federal Credit Union at 1900 South Clinton Avenue when he observed an individual enter the vestibule area wearing a heavy winter coat, had his face covered by a mask, and dropped what appeared to be a gun. Cup exited the bank and prevented a woman from entering the bank. Cup called 911 and reported a possible robbery at the bank. Cup observed the person exit the bank and saw that he was heading toward the medical buildings near South Clinton Avenue. Cup followed the subject from a safe distance, relaying information to the 911 dispatcher and was ultimately able to get the license plate number. Thanks to the information provided by Mr. Cup, Donovan Chin was arrested for the robbery of the bank on that date and was also linked to and arrested for a robbery of the same location in December of 2008. He is now serving 8 years in State Prison.

In recognition of his actions and willingness to get involved, Mr. Peter Cup was presented with the Citizen Award.

Mr. Scott Herrmann Citizen Award

On June 20, 2009, Scott Herrmann attempted to make a delivery of flowers to a 97 year old resident on Bonnie Brae Avenue. He noted that there were three newspapers lying on the doorstep. He knocked at the door and did not get a response. Concerned that someone might be inside, he walked around the home looking into windows and saw a walker inside that appeared as though someone was moving it. With the assistance of a neighbor who had a key to the home, Herrmann made entry into the home and found the resident had fallen and was injured and had been on the floor for a number of days. Herrmann called 911 and waited for ambulance personnel to arrive. The 97 year old, who was in serious condition, was taken to the hospital by Brighton Volunteer Ambulance.

In recognition of his persistence and willingness to take action, Scott Herrmann was presented with the Citizen Award.

TOURS

In 2010, the Department conducted a number of tours of the Police facility. Included in these tours are the general facility, computer room and MoRIS (Monroe Rochester Identification System), booking area, prisoner cells, Records Division, and Police vehicles. In some instances the Officers take group pictures of the touring guests.

BIKE RODEO

The Brighton Police Department, along with Brighton Rotary, and the Parks and Recreation Department held a bike, scooter and roller blade rodeo in the parking lot at Meridian Centre on June 5, 2010. The rodeo included safety talks and skill testing on an obstacle course. Approximately 100 children, ages 5 -11, attended the event.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In 2009, the Police Department began putting weekly Police Blotters on its web site. The Blotter is a weekly composite of crimes occurring in Brighton, as well as occasional tips on keeping individuals, families, and property safe and secure. It is intended to inform and better prepare residents to take an active role in crime prevention and deterrence. The items contained in the Blotter were taken from our weekly Crime Coordinator's Agenda, a listing compiled by individual police agencies throughout Monroe County and shared weekly.

An ongoing departmental initiative involves keeping an up-to-date list of vulnerable populations and notifying them about sex offenders who may have moved into or work in Brighton. The Brighton Police Department receives written communication from the New York State Sex Offender Registry any time a person designated as a sex offender either moves into or works in our Town. The Brighton Police Department then attempts to notify organizations defined by New York State as vulnerable (schools, day care centers, etc.). The Brighton Police Department will also do community notifications of sex offenders in accordance with state regulations.

COMMUNITY SERVICES 2010

CHILD SEAT SAFETY CHECKS

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) reports that 8 out of 10 child safety seats are installed improperly. In New York State, those statistics are even more alarming. Nine out of ten child safety seats in New York are reported as being unsafe. The Brighton Police Department is doing its part to help combat those shocking statistics. Our Child Safety Seat program has highly trained Police Officers dedicated not only to the safety of our community's children, but to the education of the parents, grandparents and caregivers watching over them. The Brighton Police Department holds monthly car seat checkpoints for interested residents. Residents can schedule an appointment by calling 784-5389.

PHARMACEUTICAL DROP-OFF

To reduce potential sources of environmental contamination, the Brighton Police Department, in conjunction with the Monroe County Department of Environmental Services, now organizes periodical pharmaceutical waste collections to provide our residents with a safe and proper way to dispose of their unused or unwanted medications. This service is free of charge to Monroe County residents. Persons interested in this program can check the Town's web page at www.townofbrighton.org or www.monroecounty.gov for announcements on upcoming dates.

PRESENTATIONS

Brighton Police Department Officers are available to assist neighborhood groups that wish to set up **Neighborhood Watch Programs**. Officers give presentations about crime prevention and security precautions and address concerns of Brighton residents.

In an effort to educate and aid the Brighton community in crime prevention and personal safety, Brighton Police Department Officers make presentations to Brighton organizations on a variety of topics. 

CRIME STATISTICS

In 2007, the Brighton Police Department began using the New York State Incident Based Reporting (NYSIBR) system to provide crime statistics to the Division of Criminal Justice Services of New York.

In previous years, we reported via the Uniformed Crime Report system (**UCR**) which was designed to tally the most serious offense reported to a law enforcement agency.

Within NYSIBR, instead of tallying certain key events or most serious offense, data is collected on all criminal offenses within an incident, not just the most serious offense.





FIVE YEAR VIEW




BY HOUR OF DAY









DOMESTIC VIOLENCE INCIDENTS

2010

It is the policy of the Brighton Police Department to treat Domestic Violence as criminal conduct. All reports and allegations of Domestic Violence will be fully investigated by a member of the Brighton Police Department.

An incident of Domestic Violence is defined as any disturbance, dispute, violence, or report of an offense within a domestic relationship where police intervention is requested.

A domestic relationship includes persons who:

- *are legally married to one another*
- *were formally married to one another*
- *are related by blood*
- *are related by marriage*
- *have a child in common*
- *are currently or previously involved in a significant intimate or dating relationship regardless of whether or not they previously lived together (includes same sex couples)*
- *are specified such by law (e.g., foster- families and step-families)*

In 2010, the Department investigated **431** calls that were of a domestic nature. This reflects a **6%** decrease from the 457 calls in 2009. Of the total calls responded to in 2010, **70** resulted in an arrest and criminal prosecution of the offender when a Penal Law statute was violated.











IDENTIFICATION DIVISION

2010

The Identification Division serves the needs of law enforcement with technical investigations, evidence gathering, and related records and documentation.

The unit is staffed by one full-time investigator and seven trained crime scene technicians drawn from the ranks of the Road Patrol. These officers serve on a part-time basis when required, and operate from an on-call schedule. The ID Investigator monitors the duties of the part-time technician staff. In addition, he maintains watchfulness over their work to ensure that the highest quality technical services are made available to the Police Department. He also trains and monitors the work of other officers who are trained in the area of fingerprinting of arrested prisoners.

The ID Investigator also processes crime scenes; classifies, examines and is certified to compare latent fingerprints to secure criminal convictions; fingerprints and photographs arrested persons; provides fingerprinting services for civilians seeking various licenses, permits, security clearances, etc.; maintains all photographic, video and evidence gathering equipment; provides criminal detection methods and maintains and updates arrest data of the Monroe/Rochester Identification System (MoRIS) a county wide electronic fingerprint and mug shot data based tied into the Brighton Police Department; and is the Evidence Coordinator between the Police Department and the Monroe County Regional Crime Laboratory, State Automated Fingerprint Identification System (SAFIS), the Monroe County Medical Examiners Office and the Monroe County District Attorney's Office.

In 2010, the Brighton Police Department was chosen to participate in a DNA Initiative Grant. Federal funds were secured to purchase new equipment to assist in obtaining DNA at burglary scenes. Specifically, the Brighton Police Department ID Division purchased a new alternative light source to assist in locating potential sources of DNA.

The ID Investigator also serves as the Property Clerk: receiving and securing all incoming property and evidence; releases and purges same; organizes periodic public auctions to liquidate abandoned property; and maintains all files necessary for the integrity of this vital link between the criminal act and successful prosecution. The property room inventory is kept electronically with the use of bar coding. The current system in place allows for seamless transfer of evidence to the Monroe County Public Safety Laboratory, which uses the same software vendor.

In summary, the Identification Unit is a general clearinghouse for all police photography, crime scene evidence, fingerprint packages, reports of technical investigations and other ID matters. Its functions are crucial to the operations of the Department, since the preservation and handling of evidence will often relate directly to the outcome and final disposition of criminal cases. Identification services are available twenty-four hours a day throughout the year.

Crime Scene Technicians (CST) are listed first, followed by other officers. Many jobs requiring photography are handled by Road Patrol sergeants, as well as by members of the Investigative Services Division, to accomplish the goals of their own investigations. The total number of jobs handled by each officer is noted, followed by the percentage he contributed to the total workload, the total number of photographs the officer took, with the average number of photographs taken at each job handled. There are many jobs where fingerprints, exclusive of other forms of evidence, play no part. For the Crime Scene Technicians, the last column reflects the total number of latent fingerprint lifts gathered in evidence during the year.

GENERAL OUTPUT

1. **96 individual latent finger or palm prints** were developed and lifted at crime scenes or at the Brighton Police Department laboratory facilities during 2010. Many of these were identified either through hand searching through leads developed by Investigative Services Division personnel or through SAFIS (Statewide Automated Fingerprint Identification System), a valuable investigative tool of the Division of Criminal Justice Services which scans latent fingerprints, then compares the images with over a million sets of fingerprints on file in Albany.
2. **6066 photographs** were taken, both at crime scenes, accidents and other incidents, and of arrested individuals for identification purposes.
3. **No Suspect ID composites** were made during 2010. However, numerous Police Bulletins were produced using the images of criminals obtained from surveillance video cameras.
4. **Overtime** used for ID work in 2010: **55.5 hours**

ARREST PROCESSING

1. There were **634 arrested persons** processed through the Monroe/Rochester Identification System (MoRIS) for various felonies, misdemeanors, and violations.

PROPERTY / EVIDENCE

1. There were **935 cases** of recorded property or evidence into the Property Room.



The Animal Control Department generated a revenue total for the Town of \$13,701.17 in **2010** for licenses, fines and fees.

On Saturday October 2, 2010, the Town of Brighton, in conjunction with the Monroe County Health Department, hosted the 17th annual Rabies Immunization Clinic for cats, dogs and ferrets at the Town Highway Department building. A total of 163 pets were vaccinated at the clinic.
